### Student Testimony Jarrod Houseknecht, Pepperdine University 2023

### Why did you decide to come to Augsburg for the Summer Program?

To be honest, I had never heard of Augsburg before Pepperdine informed me about the program. After doing some research, I knew I had to jump on this opportunity. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, I had my previous study abroad experience pulled out from under me and when the chance to spend the summer in one of the cutest cities in Germany arrived, I had to jump on it.
